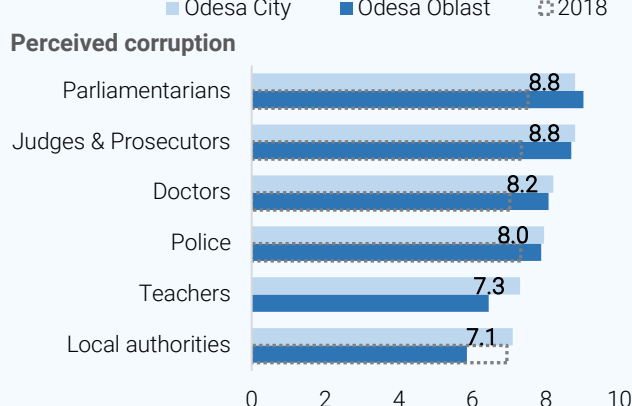
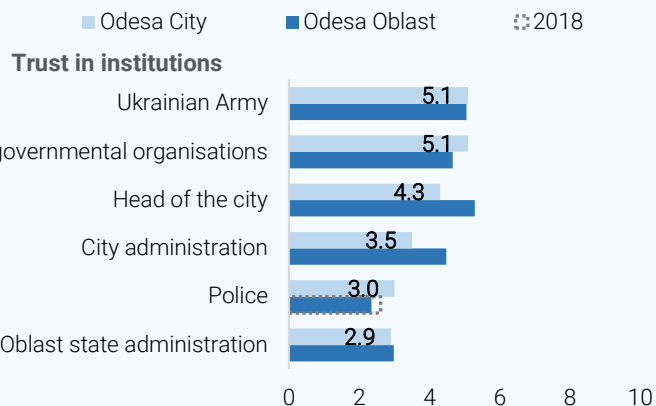

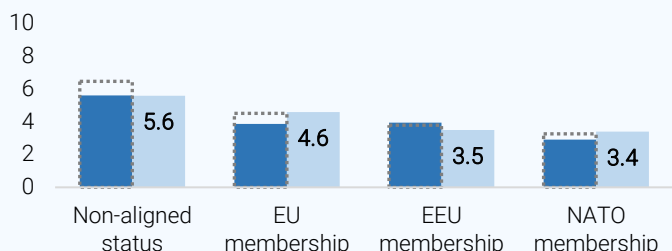
GOOD GOVERNANCE



Citizens in Odesa city and oblast have little trust in the oblast administration (3.5 on the national level). Trust in the police is slightly higher in Odesa city compared to the rest of the oblast (2.3) but remains low with 79% of citizens in Odesa city mistrusting the police.

Citizens in Odesa city perceive significantly higher level of corruption among local authorities compared to the rest of the country (4.9 on the national level). 43% of citizens in Odesa city believe local authorities always ask for additional payments to provide services.

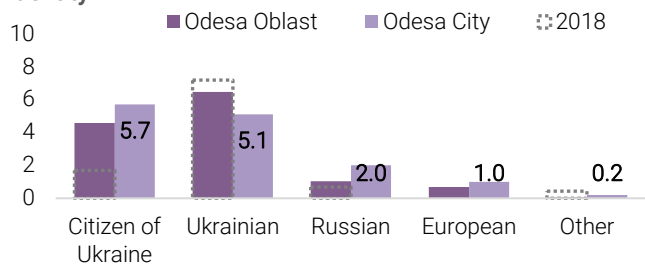
Geo-political aspirations



Relations between citizens and local authorities are concerning in Odesa city. In March 2020, EUAM launched the “Knowledge Hub” in Odesa serving as a space to exchange ideas on reform, build trust, and help improve coordination for civil society, law enforcement and local authorities. Facilitate such initiatives that also include citizens aiming for transparent and responsible governance ensuring authorities listen and respond to the needs of citizens.

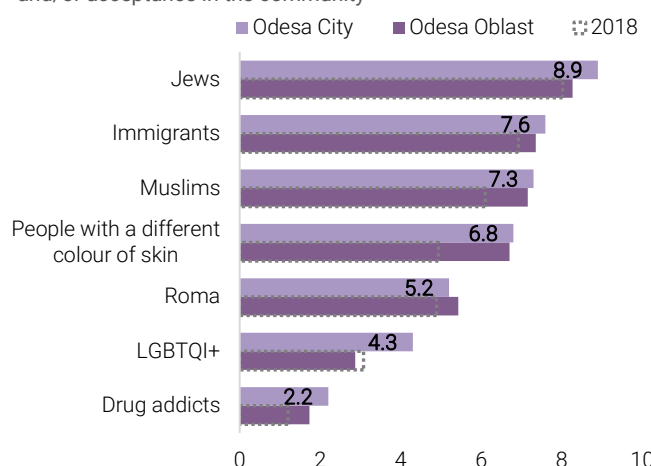

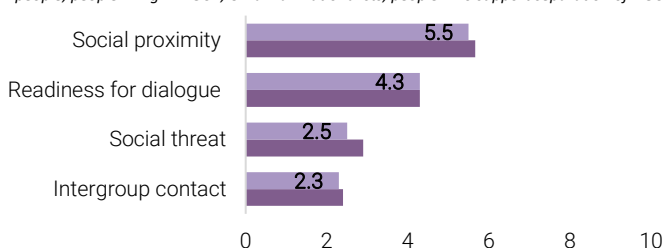
Social Tolerance

The combined level of social tolerance in terms of personal interaction and/or acceptance in the community



Intergroup relations

With different socio-demographic groups as their close friends and colleagues (i.e. IDPs, ATO/JFO military personnel, people from western Ukraine, people from eastern Ukraine, pro-EU and pro-Russia oriented people, people living in NGCA, Ukrainian nationalists, people who support separation of NGCA).



Facilitate safe spaces for dialogue allowing for negative perceptions towards the other to transform into more pluralistic and broader understanding of other socio-political and demographic groups. Tackling fears and jointly developing an inclusive civic identity could help counter social divides and stereotypes.

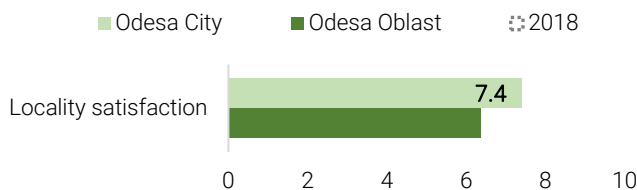
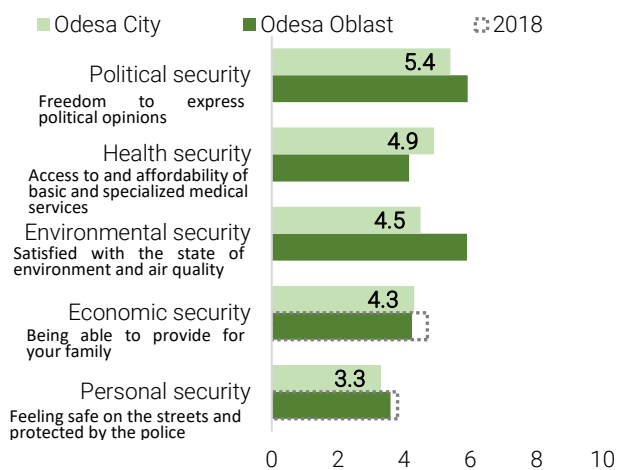
42% of citizens in Odesa city believe an increasing number of IDPs might undermine the unity of their community.

Safety & Security



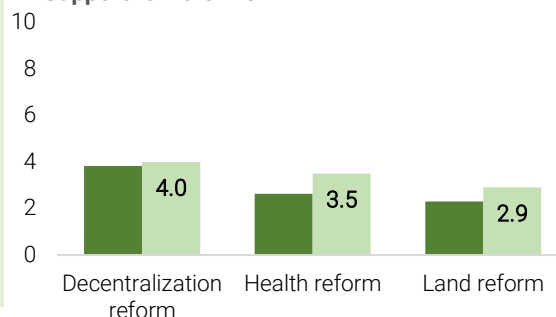
Personal security is low both among citizens of Odesa city and across the oblast. Establish online early-warning systems in collaboration with the district police where people can report any suspicious activities. This could also improve the responsiveness of the police force and their visibility. Organize public meetings with local authorities and police to discuss causes of insecurity to design tailored interventions responding to citizens' fears.

79% of citizens in Odesa city do not feel safe to walk alone in the street at night.

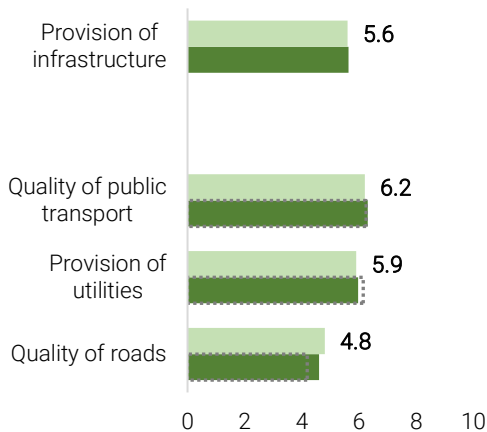
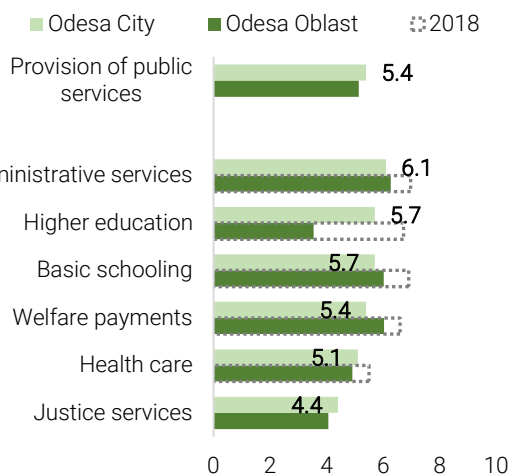
64% of citizens in Odesa city do not feel they could rely on social payments if they needed them.

Support for reforms is higher in Odesa city compared to the oblast. However, 62% of citizens in Odesa city believe the health reform will reduce the quality of medical services.

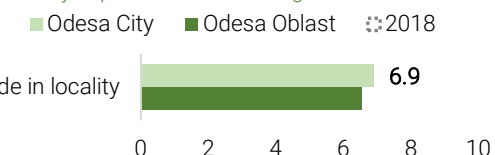

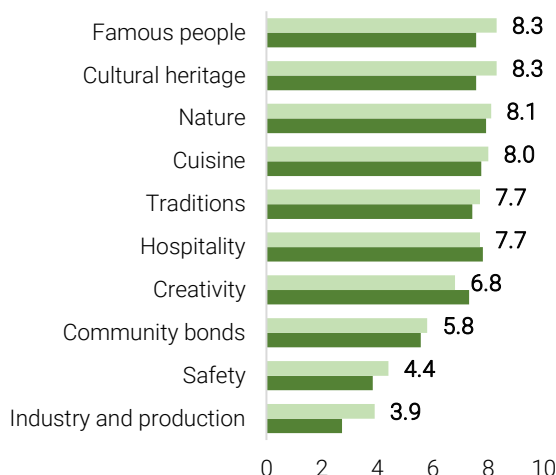


Pride in your locality

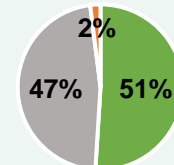
When you think about your locality, to what extent are you proud of the following?
