Since 2015, SeeD has been trying to inform Social Cohesion efforts by providing methodological, analytical, and empirical contributions to the concept.




SEED's JOURNEY IN UKRAINE

- Propose a Social Cohesion model that is measurable using indicators from the SCORE library, helping to tailor decision-making and targeted programs accordingly.












SCORE-INSPIRED HOLISTIC ASSESSMENT OF RESILIENCE OF **POPULATION (SHARP):**

Assessing Social Cohesion, Resistance, and People's Needs in Ukraine Amid Russian Full-Scale Invasion – Wave 1 (2022)


















PROPOSED DEFINITION of SOCIAL COHESION

Social Cohesion

can be defined as a <u>state</u> of vertical and horizontal connections between actors in a society and as a <u>process</u> of society functioning

- acts as the "glue" that binds together diverse or dissimilar parts of a vibrant society;
- refers to interconnectedness and harmonious relations among individuals, communities and institutions;
- implies presence of strong social bonds, shared values, and a common identity(ties) or sense of belongings among citizens (which might at the same time belong to different social, ideological, ethnic, religious etc. groups);
- encompasses willingness to collaborate and work together towards common goals;
- relies on inclusion and integration of groups with special needs (including internally displaced persons, veterans, people living with disabilities etc.) and marginalized groups (Roma, LGBTQI+ etc.) etc.

DEFINING KEY ELEMENTS OF SOCIAL COHESION: Comparative insights

(overall SeeD has experience of working with SCORE in 20+ countries)

NB! Note that the Integral Index of Social Cohesion is employed primarily in countries where the number of social cohesion indicators is relatively limited.


MAIN CHALLENGES

- Broad and Multisystemic: Social Cohesion concept is intricately linked to Social Inclusion but encompasses a broader scope. While social inclusion focuses on ensuring that all individuals have equal access to resources and opportunities within society, social cohesion goes further by emphasizing the interconnectedness and sense of belonging among diverse groups within a community or society as a whole, as well as their relations with state institutions.
- Brings diverse parts together. While solidarity emphasizes the unity and support within a group or society, cohesion focuses on the interconnectedness and interactions among its diverse components.
- Highly contextual and evolving: During wartime, factors such as displacement, destruction of social infrastructure, economic disruption, trauma, mental health issues, as well as polarization and division significantly impact the dynamics of social cohesion. Social cohesion is time and context bound.
























% "Not at all" responses











KEY TAKEAWAYS

4 out of 9 social cohesion indicators increased in 2023 compared to 2021. The rest remained the same on the national level. Although **vertical cohesion** indicators increased, they are still **lowest ranking** and at risk of erosion.

Invest in citizen - state relations and sense of representation

Increases in civic duty and belonging did not translate into an **increase** in **Community Cooperation**. Improvements in vertical cohesion via the Authorities Care indicator would have a direct positive influence on Community Cooperation.

 Invest in meaningful and frequent public consultation mechanisms on the local level

Social Tolerance, especially towards LGBTQI, Roma community and drug addicts, **is about building an inclusive and rights based society**. Gender inclusion and human rights are significant drivers of tolerance.

- Invest in **cooperative relationships across different groups** such professional or academic twinning programmes, family support hubs.
- Create positive media content that transforms stereotypes and prejudices towards minority groups.
